## **AT A GLANCE**

**History/Location:** The University of Delaware, a state assisted institution, is a Land Grant, Sea Grant, Space Grant, Urban Grant, Carnegie Doctoral/Research Extensive University. The University, with origins in 1743, was chartered by the State of Delaware in 1833. A Women's College was opened in 1914, and in 1945 UD became permanently coeducational. The main campus is located in Newark, Delaware, a suburban community of 30,000 situated midway between Philadelphia and Baltimore. Courses are also offered at the Wilmington campus and at other locations throughout the State, including Dover, Georgetown, and Lewes.

**Academic Schools, Programs, and Degrees:** Agriculture and Natural Resources; Arts and Science; Business and Economics; Engineering; Health and Nursing Sciences; Human Services, Education and Public Policy; and Marine Studies. UD offers 122 undergraduate, 75 master's programs, and 34 doctoral programs. In 2000-01, UD awarded 3,192 bachelor's degrees, 726 master's degrees, and 161 doctoral degrees. Doctoral and professional degrees were awarded in Agriculture, Economics, Education, Engineering, Individual and Family Studies, Marine Studies, Urban Affairs, and a range of Arts & Science disciplines (including Chemistry, Computer and Information Sciences, English, and History).

**Faculty:** In 2001-02, there are 1,049 full-time faculty positions. 80% of full-time faculty are tenured and 88% hold the doctorate or terminal professional degree in their field. Average total compensation in 2001-02 is \$127,300 for Full Professors, \$92,500 for Associate Professors, and \$73,800 for Assistant Professors.

**Enrollment:** Fall 2001 enrollment totals 20,949 which include 16,307 undergraduates, 2,942 graduate students, and 1,700 professional and continuing studies students. 15,134 (93%) of undergraduate and 2,171 (74%) of graduate students are enrolled on a full-time basis. 41% of undergraduate students are male. 60% of undergraduate and 66% of graduate students are from out-of-state. 6% of undergraduate and 4% of graduate students are African-American. Approximately 50% of undergraduate students live in residence halls.

**Admissions/Retention:** 3,379 first-time freshmen enrolled in Fall 2001. 35% of all admitted freshmen applicants were enrolled. Average SAT score for enrolled freshmen was 1159. On average, 88% of freshmen return for their sophomore year and approximately 3 out of 4 students graduate.

**Costs:** Annual full-time undergraduate tuition and fees are \$5,290 (in-state) and \$14,380 (out-of-state). Room and board is \$5,534.

**Budget:** For Fiscal Year 2001, Total Operating Revenues were \$487.7 million, including \$98.8 million for State Appropriations. Total Operating Expenses and Transfers were \$487.7 million. Sponsored Research Expenditures were \$65.5 million.

**Institutional Affiliations:** UD is a member of the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges (NASULGC). In athletics, UD began NCAA Division I competition in 1973 for men and 1982 for women. UD competes in Division I-AA for Football, and in Division I-A for all other sports. UD is a member of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference, the America East Conference in Field Hockey and Men's and Women's Soccer and Cross-country, and the Colonial Athletic Association in all other sports.



### TRENDS IN FRESHMAN ADMISSIONS ACTIVITY







### TRENDS IN FRESHMAN TO SOPHOMORE YEAR RETENTION





# OPERATING REVENUE, EXPENSES AND TRANSFERS



# UNIVERSITY LIBRARY

## Facilities and Services

The University of Delaware Library includes the Morris Library, where the main collection is housed, three branch libraries located in Newark, the Agriculture Library, the Chemistry Library, and the Physics Library and a fourth branch library, the Marine Studies Library in Lewes, Delaware.

The collections of the University of Delaware Library parallel the University's academic interests and support all disciplines. Books, periodicals, microforms, government publications, computer databases and software, maps, manuscripts, media, and Internet access provide a major academic resource for the University of Delaware, the surrounding community, the State of Delaware, and the nation.

The University of Delaware Library is a depository library for U.S. government publications, a patent depository for U.S. patents and a repository for State of Delaware publications. Library staff members provide a wide range of services including reference assistance, circulation, interlibrary loan, instructional programs, assistance to the visually impaired, and computerized literature searches.

The Morris Library, the main library where the bulk of the collection is housed, seats over 3,000 persons. The University of Delaware Library is a member of the Association of Research Libraries, the Center for Research Libraries, CIRLA (the Chesapeake Information and Research Library Alliance), and PALINET through which it is a connected online member to OCLC, the Online Computer Library Center. 

## Electronic Library Resources
