

# 2007-08

## AT A GLANCE

**History/Location:** The University of Delaware, a state assisted institution, is a Land Grant, Sea Grant, Space Grant, Urban Grant, Carnegie Research University (very high research activity). The University, with origins in 1743, was chartered by the State of Delaware in 1833. A Women's College was opened in 1914, and in 1945 UD became permanently coeducational. The main campus is located in Newark, Delaware, a suburban community of nearly 30,000, situated midway between Philadelphia and Baltimore. Courses are also offered at the Wilmington campus and at other locations throughout the State, including Dover, Georgetown, Milford, and Lewes.

Academic Schools, Programs, and Degrees: Agriculture and Natural Resources; Arts and Sciences; Business and Economics; Engineering; Health Sciences; Human Services, Education and Public Policy; and Marine and Earth Studies. UD offers 4 associate's programs, 130 bachelor's programs, 79 master's programs, 39 doctoral programs, and 4 dual graduate programs. In 2006-07, UD awarded 162 associate's degrees, 3,416 bachelor's degrees, 773 master's degrees, and 224 doctoral degrees. Doctoral and professional degrees were awarded in Agriculture, Business and Economics, Education, Engineering, Individual and Family Studies, Marine Studies, Nursing, Urban Affairs and Public Policy, and a range of Arts & Sciences disciplines (including Art History, Biological Sciences, Chemistry and Biochemistry, Computer and Information Sciences, English, History, Linguistics, Mathematical Sciences, Physical Therapy, Physics, Political Science and International Relations, Psychology, and Sociology).

**Institutional Accreditation:** The University of Delaware has been continuously accredited by the Middle States Commission on Higher Education since that organization's inception in 1921. The University's accreditation was reaffirmed in 2006 and its next self-study evaluation is scheduled for 2011. The regional, national and specialized accrediting organizations that accredit UD's programs/degrees appear at the end of this book.

**Faculty:** In 2007-08, there are 1,117 full-time faculty positions. Approximately 80% of full-time tenure-eligible faculty are tenured and over 80% of full-time faculty hold the doctorate or terminal professional degree in their field. Average total compensation in 2007-08 is \$160,932 for Full Professors, \$112,828 for Associate Professors, and \$93,262 for Assistant Professors.

**Enrollment:** Fall 2007 enrollment totals 20,342 which include 15,983 undergraduates, 3,405 graduate students, and 954 professional and continuing studies students. 15,152 (95%) of undergraduate and 2,514 (74%) of graduate students are enrolled on a full-time basis. 42% of undergraduate students are male. 62% of undergraduate and 69% of graduate students are from out-of-state. 5.7% of undergraduate and 4.6% of graduate students are African-American. Approximately 50% of undergraduate students live in residence halls.

**Admissions/Retention:** Over 20,000 students applied to the University of Delaware for Fall 2007 enrollment. 3,949 (33%) first-time freshmen accepted their admission offers. Average SAT score (critical reading plus mathematics) for first-time Newark Campus freshmen was 1184. On average, 90% of Newark Campus freshmen return for their sophomore year and more than 3 out of 4 students graduate within five years.

**Costs:** Annual full-time undergraduate tuition and fees for 2007-08 are \$8,150 (in-state) and \$19,400 (out-of-state). Room and board is \$7,948. Total undergraduate costs for 2007-08 are \$16,098 (in-state) and \$27,348 (out-of-state).

**Finances:** For Fiscal Year 2007, Total Operating Revenues were \$654.1 million, including \$122.8 million for State Appropriations. Total Operating Expenses and Transfers were \$654.1 million. Externally Funded Activity totaled \$156.1 million.

**Institutional Affiliations:** UD is a member of the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges (NASULGC). In athletics, UD began NCAA Division I competition in 1973 for men and 1982 for women. UD competes in Division I-AA for Football and in Division I-A for all other sports. UD is a member of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference and the Colonial Athletic Association for all other sports.

# **NEW UNIVERSITY INITIATIVES**

### Louise and David Roselle Center for the Arts

The \$48 million Louise and David Roselle Center for the Arts, constructed on Orchard Road adjacent to the Amy E. du Pont Music Building, provides new performance spaces for music and theatre. The 92,000 gross-square-foot performing arts facility also includes a 200-seat recital hall, a 300-seat orchestra hall, a 450 seat proscenium theatre and 32 music practice rooms. The architect for the Center for the Arts is Ayers Saint Gross of Baltimore. This project, which opened in August 2006, was funded through generous donations and University resources.

### Residence Halls

The University has constructed three new residence halls on the Laird campus providing 1,000 beds. These buildings replaced the former 750 bed Pencader complex that consisted of 12 residential buildings and three commons buildings. The \$72 million project began in 2004 with the 500 bed George Read Hall opening in the fall of 2005 and Thomas McKean and James Smith Halls, each housing 250 students, opening in the fall of 2006. The fall of 2006 also saw the opening of a new pedestrian bridge connecting the Laird Campus with Ray Street.

An additional 600 bed residence hall is currently under construction on the Laird Campus with completion slated for the fall of 2008. This additional building will facilitate the University's renovation of its east and west campus residence halls (Russell, Gilbert, Harrington, Dickinson, Rodney) that were built in the 1960's through early 1970's. These residence hall complexes range in size from 600-850 beds and having the added capacity will allow an entire complex to be renovated at one time. Renovation of the Russell complex has begun in phases with completion of the last phase scheduled for the fall of 2009. The Harrington complex will follow during the 2008-2009 academic year.

### **Brown Laboratory**

The University is completing a major renovation of Brown Laboratory. Brown Lab was constructed in 1937, and houses the Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry. The south wing of Brown Lab was renovated in 1994-95 at a cost of \$6.5 million. The north and west wings, however, contain out-of-date laboratory, research, and support space, and require extensive renovation at an estimated cost in excess of \$29 million. Given the central role that the Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry plays in supporting a number of sectors in Delaware's economy, modern and functional research facilities are not only an investment in the University, but in the State's fiscal health as well. This project is funded through University and State resources and will be completed in the fall of 2007.

### **Enrollment Services Center**

A new two-story building of approximately 26,000 square feet is being constructed on South College Avenue opposite the Morris Library. This building will house the offices of Admissions, Financial Aid and Registrar as well as the Admissions Visitors Center now located in an adjacent house. The current Visitors Center is inadequate for the volume of prospective students visiting the campus. Co-location of the enrollment services departments will result in operating efficiencies not possible with the present multiple location environment.






### OPERATING REVENUE, EXPENSES AND TRANSFERS Fiscal Year 2007

### **UNIVERSITY LIBRARY**

### Facilities and Services

The University of Delaware Library includes the Morris Library, where the main collection is housed, three branch libraries located in Newark – the Agriculture Library, the Chemistry Library (which is temporarily closed for renovation), and the Physics Library – and a fourth branch library, the Marine Studies Library in Lewes, Delaware.

The collections of the University of Delaware Library parallel the University's academic interests and support all disciplines. Books, periodicals, electronic journals, databases, microforms, government publications, and software, maps, manuscripts, media, and Internet access provide a major academic resource for the University of Delaware, the surrounding community, the State of Delaware, and the nation.

The University of Delaware Library is a depository library for U.S. government publications, a patent depository for U.S. patents and a repository for State of Delaware publications. Library staff members provide a wide range of services including reference assistance, circulation, interlibrary loan, instructional programs, assistance to users with disabilities, and assistance to faculty, staff and students in the Student Multimedia Design Center.

The Morris Library, the main library where the main collection is housed, seats over 3,000 persons. The University of Delaware Library is a member of the Association of Research Libraries, the Center for Research Libraries, CIRLA (the Chesapeake Information and Research Library Alliance), and PALINET through which it is connected online to OCLC, the Online Computer Library Center.



The Library Web Site serves as a gateway research tool and provides gateway access to electronic resources on the Web including electronic access to resources that are locally licensed for University of Delaware faculty, students, and staff only. The Morris Library provides seating for more than 3,000 persons; wireless access in most areas; special purpose space for computer-based systems; more than 200 computer workstations accessible to users, more than 200 laptop connections for University of Delaware users to connect personal laptops (including all graduate student carrels); the Student Multimedia Design Center; a current periodical reading room; self-service photocopiers; microform reader/printers including a digital microform workstation; a large reserve reading room; small research studies for which faculty may request use; a GIS workstation; special equipment and areas to assist users with disabilities; a media area and viewing room; small group study rooms for student use; a handsome Special Collections area including an exhibition gallery and a reading room with a controlled environmental system for rare materials; and many other areas and services.
