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## Program Overview and Requirements

This minor will equip you to communicate effectively with Spanish-speaking patients or clients within a healthcare setting, either domestically or globally.

### FAQs

#### What courses are considered "equivalent" to HLTH411?

Courses in the field of health sciences that have a **cultural orientation**, and that allow students to focus on **issues that affect the Hispanic community** are usually accepted as substitutes for HLTH411. Common recent substitutions include: [HLTH241](#): Ethical Aspects of Healthcare, and [HLTH245](#): Cultural Awareness for Health and Healthcare. **Note**: Be sure to consult with the Minor Advisor **before enrolling** to make sure that the course substitution will be approved.

#### Can I count volunteer work in a Spanish-speaking country as a substitute for SPAN319 (the Spanish Healthcare Internship)?

If the volunteer work meets certain criteria (it involves at least 20 hours of work in a healthcare setting, it is academically supervised and assessed, and it involves substantial use of Spanish on the part of the student), it could be used as a substitute for SPAN319. However, **PRIOR** approval of this work by the *Minor Advisor* is **required**.
