The topics have applications to weather forecasting, space physics and industrial flows.

Developing Outstanding Students in the World of Fashion



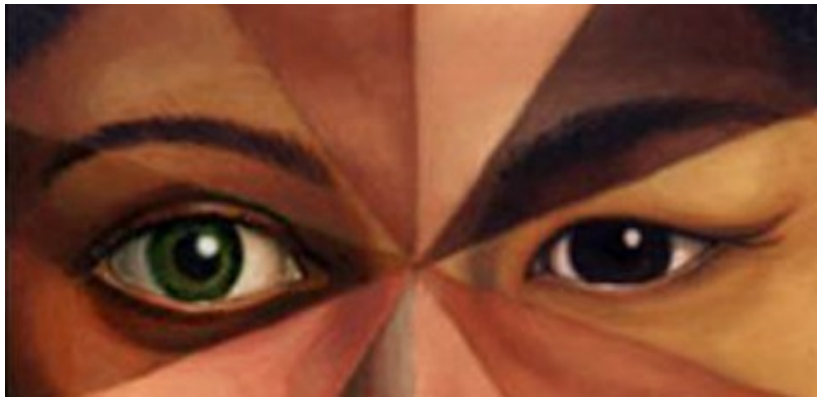
The Department of Fashion and Apparel Studies continues its record of having outstanding undergraduate students who earn national recognitions.

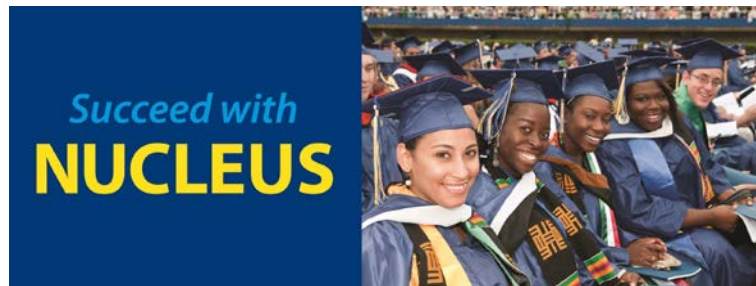

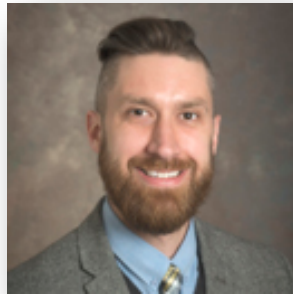
