0. Problems & Parameters:

• Managing the 3 M's: Might, Money, Myth (in other words: brute force, marshalling of resources, and ideology)

Relationship between power and legitimacy in the governing of the country

1. Overview of the situation and trends in 16th century Japan

a. The scene: no effective central authority; civil wars

b. The spectators: the emperor and the imperial court

the Ashikaga shogun most commoners

c. The actors: **samurai** ("one who serves"),

daimyô ("big name" = domainal lord)

2. Unification at the national level

a. Oda Nobunaga (1534–1582)

"He pounded the rice cake."

Strong on "might"

b. Toyotomi Hideyoshi (1536–1598)

"He baked the rice cake."

Strong on "might"; made headway in "money"

c. Tokugawa leyasu (1546–1616) & Co. "He ate the rice cake."

The ate the fice cake.

Secured might, money, and . . . myth:

3. Mythmaking at Nikkô; or, The Apotheosis of Tokugawa Authority

- a. leyasu as kami (shintô deity) and Buddha
- b. The building and rebuilding of leyasu's mausoleum, the Tôshôgu at Nikkô
- c. The ritualization of authority
