## Success through Sacrifice: Empowering English Learners through Creative Nonfiction

Having reached the pinnacle of the K-12 experience, twelfth graders are ready to leave school far behind, that is if they have spent those years in an American school, reading, writing, speaking, and listening to English. I have the distinct pleasure of teaching twelfth graders who are experiencing their first, second, or third year in the American K-12 school system. These kids are motivated! Students' work will be assessed based on the quality of work they contribute at their individual English language proficiency level.
