Abstract

The three major objectives of the Project for the Study of Intelligence and Society have been to produce new scientific knowledge about the societal consequences of ability differences, to promote the wider dissemination of such information, and to promote constructive debate over policy options. Four major projects are proposed this year to further these objectives. First, a special issue of the Journal of Vocational Behavior, "Fairness in Employment Testing," will be produced. This follows-up our earlier one, "The g Factor in Employment." Second, a conference will be organized to examine the implications of recent research on g (general intelligence) for educational policy. Third, a paper will be written on the consequences of certain race-conscious procedures for scoring employment tests. And fourth, a recent publication from the Project will be distributed to 3,500 relevant individuals.

Dear Mr. Weyher:

For the last two years, the Pioneer Fund has supported activities of the Project for the Study of Intelligence and Society, of which Robert Gordon and I are co-directors, exclusively through the Johns Hopkins University. For bureaucratic reasons, this year Dr. Gordon and I will be submitting separate proposals through our respective institutions for our individual and joint activities. This letter constitutes a proposal to the Pioneer Fund for funding several Project activities at the University of Delaware during the period 6/1/88-5/31/89. Dr. Gordon will submit his proposal at a later date.

I provide below a brief description of each of the major activities at Delaware and the kinds of resources they require. They include producing another special issue of the Journal of Vocational Behavior, planning a conference on g (general intelligence) and education, writing two papers, and sending out a large mailing related to crime and IQ. A total of \$32,965 is requested to support these activities.

All are designed to further three objectives of the Project for the Study of Intelligence and Society: (1) to develop through research, or stimulate others to develop, new knowledge regarding g and its consequences for individuals and society, (2) to disseminate important information regarding g more widely, both by producing materials (for example, edited volumes that integrate and bring more visibility to different streams of relevant research) and by distributing them to strategic audiences, and (3) to stimulate more constructive debate concerning policy options for dealing justly and effectively with individual and group differences in ability (for example, by creating public forums for discussion and debate).

1988 JVB Special Issue

In October 1987 the Personnel Testing Council of Southern California held the conference, "Fairness in Employment Testing," which followed up its conference of two years earlier entitled "The g Factor in Employment Testing." The 1986 special issue of the Journal of Vocational Behavior (JVB) was based on the 1985 conference. The JVB has now agreed to publish a second special issue based on the follow-up conference. It is scheduled to appear December 1988 and will be co-edited by myself and James Sharf, a research psychologist at the U. S. Office of Personnel Management who has

been very active in influencing case law in employment testing.

A survey of the audience confirmed our impression that attendees found the 1987 conference exciting, informative, and thought provoking. Thus there is every reason to believe that the second special issue will be greeted with the same interest and enthusiasm as was the first.

The six conference presenters have submitted written versions of their presentations for publication in the special issue. A list of these presenters is shown in the enclosed flier for the October 1987 conference. The special issue will also include commentary by seven diverse contributors. They include two lawyers who are active in this area of litigation (Larry Lorber for the defense and Barry Goldstein for the plaintiff), two economists with opposing views about the value of tests (John Bishop, who writes about the strong relation between test scores and U. S. productivity, and Henry Levin, who disputes such conclusions), two senior personnel professionals in large organizations (Augie Ryanen, who is deputy director of personnel in the Los Angeles school system, and Jon Bentz, who recently retired as chief of personnel research at Sears Roebuck), and one sociologist with long-standing interests in testing, group differences, and social policy (Robert Gordon).

Also in this connection, the Washington chapter of the Personnel Testing Council was stimulated by the California conference to schedule its own conference in Washington, D. C. on July 13 with several of the original presenters and some of the scheduled JVB commentators. I have been asked to present a paper at that conference.

Tasks in the JVB project include coordinating and thoroughly editing the manuscripts, communicating with authors about revisions, dealing with the publisher regarding the details of production, and proofreading the entire volume. I will also be preparing a presentation for the Washington, D. C. conference. Funding is requested primarily for xeroxing, telephone, clerical assistance, and six weeks of my time.

In much the same way that we distributed the first special issue widely, we plan to distribute the second one to the Project's mailing list and to selected other individuals. I will seek funding for that effort at a later date after the costs can be better determined.

Delaware Conference on g and Educational Policy

I have organized a colloquium series at the University of Delaware for the coming academic year entitled "Dealing with Ability Differences in a Democracy: Challenge to Educational Policy." A description of that series is enclosed in the form of the proposal I submitted to the Dean of the College of Education, which will be funding the series. The speakers include myself, Hans Eysenck, Arthur Jensen, John B. Carroll, Robert Gordon, Lloyd Humphreys, Thomas Sticht (tentative), and Richard Lynn. All will be speaking about the nature of g and/or the educational implications of recent research on g.

The colloquium series is the first of a three-part effort to inject greater consideration of g into educational policy making. The other two parts are (a) a follow-up conference in which the issues raised in the colloquium series are debated by skeptics and educational policy makers and (b) a book for a broad professional audience.

Erlbaum Publishers is "very interested" and "favorably inclined" toward publishing the book. The enclosed letter to Lawrence Erlbaum describes the conference, the book, and my aims.

Funding (\$14,000) for the colloquium series has already been secured from the College of Education, and funding for the conference will be sought later from several foundations. As you recall, I requested (but did not use) provisional funding of \$12,000 from the Pioneer fund last summer for planning the colloquium series and related activities. My request here is for funds to begin planning for the conference prior to approaching those foundations.

Funds for this activity are requested primarily for telephone costs, clerical assistance, and a month of my time.

Paper on Race Norming and Rights

It has become increasingly apparent that the nation's dilemmas due to group differences in ability have resulted in changing views of justice and equality that disturb many thoughtful people. In recent months, Jan Blits, who is a political philosopher, and I have been outlining a paper, provisionally titled "Race Norming: Equality at Last or Lasting Inequality?," in which we describe and illustrate these shifting conceptions. The two main points of the paper will be that the new conceptions of "group rights" reflect a growing repudiation of the most fundamental (individual) rights on which our political system is based and, ironically, eventually will doom members of favored minority groups to permanent social inequality.

The paper will dissect the recent Interim Report of the prestigious National Academy of Sciences Committee on the General Aptitude Test Battery as a concrete and timely illustration of our thesis. We intend the paper for a broad audience and so will submit it to a journal like The Public Interest. An abstract of the proposed paper and of Jan Blits' vita are enclosed.

Funding is requested primarily for two weeks of my time and a month of Dr. Blits' time.

A Mailing on IQ and Crime

Robert Gordon and I will soon be mailing one of his recent journal articles, "SES versus IQ in the Race-IQ-Delinquency Model," to approximately 2500 criminologists and the 700 people now on the mailing list of the Project for the Study of Intelligence and Society. Costs for this project will be incurred at both the Johns Hopkins University and the


University of Delaware. I am requesting funding here only for those costs that I will incur at Delaware to mail the articles, which will be purchased by Dr. Gordon. Those costs will include postage for a bulk mailing, printing of some of the inserts to accompany the article, and clerical assistance.

Ad Hoc Opportunities

From time to time the Project's activities generate considerable correspondence, unforeseen speaking opportunities, and the like. The citation of Gottfredson's research in an AT&T shareholder resolution early this year was one such event that required unanticipated writing, correspondence, interviews, and distribution of materials. We consider it very important at this early stage of the Project to respond fully to all inquiries and ad hoc opportunities for informing interested individuals. It is therefore helpful to have a small reserve (\$1,000) for unexpected xeroxing, telephone, and travel.

A budget is appended to this proposal, three copies of which are enclosed. Please let me know if you wish further information.

This letter is a proposal to the Pioneer Fund to support the purchase and distribution of 6000 copies of the December 1988 special issue of the Journal of Vocational Behavior, "Fairness in Employment Testing." A total of \$38,248 is requested. This proposal constitutes an addendum to the Project for the Study of Intelligence and Society funded by the Pioneer Fund for the period 6/1/88 to 5/31/89.

The volume "Fairness in Employment Testing" brings together some of the major protagonists in scientific and legal debates about the merits of using objective tests for hiring workers. The aim of distributing the journal issue widely is to promote more constructive debate and social policy with regard to employment testing by exploring and clarifying recent scientific and legal developments. The time seems especially propitious for such clarification, because these recent developments have created considerable flux and uncertainty in the employment testing arena.

The forthcoming special issue of the JVB follows up the 1986 special issue of the Journal of Vocational Behavior, "The g Factor in Employment." That earlier special issue had a big impact on the field of personnel selection, sparking debate and influencing practice. Its influence would have been considerably diminished, or at least much delayed, had we not disseminated it widely immediately after publication with support from the Pioneer Fund. Hence, my interest in obtaining support to disseminate the 1988 volume widely in early 1989.

The most relevant target groups include members of the relevant divisions of the American Psychological Association, the American Sociological Association, the American Economic Association, and the American Bar Association. They also include all subscribers to the journal Personnel Psychology. James Sharf (my co-editor) and I are also compiling smaller miscellaneous lists, and the National Academy of Public Administration is interested in distributing copies to its 500



members. We wish to reach not only the scientists, personnel professionals, administrators, and lawyers most directly concerned with equal employment opportunity issues, but also scholars in related disciplines, whose expertise is essential for eventually coming to grips with the social and economic dilemmas associated with personnel selection. The attached budget lists the particular groups for which we will be purchasing mailing lists. We will cull these mailing lists to produce a smaller, more targeted, and non-overlapping set of names.

Five major kinds of costs will be incurred. The first four include the purchase of 6,100 copies at \$3 each, the purchase of mailing lists, printing and postage for bulk mailings, and clerical assistance. The fifth is that, due to the unusual length of the journal issue (more than 100 pages longer than usual), its publication requires approximately a \$10,000 subvention.

A budget, table of contents of the special issue, and a copy of each of the manuscripts is enclosed.






